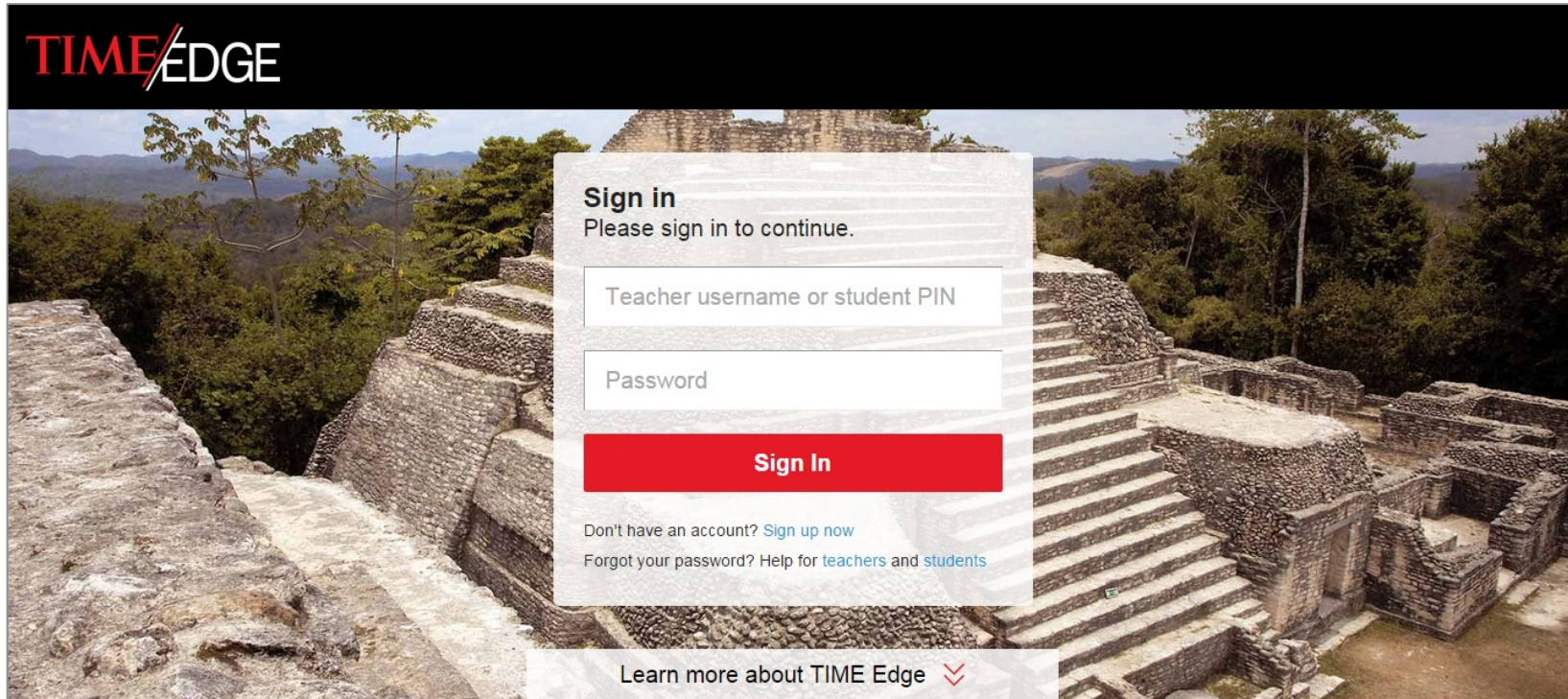

Draw Inferences Based on Textual Evidence
Explain to students that this article is a profile of India's prime minister, Narendra Modi. The writer interviewed Modi and includes quotes from and descriptions of the leader throughout the article. Based on this information, as well as the stories about Modi's life, have students determine what kind of person Modi is. Have them make a list of words they would use to describe him. Challenge students to cite textual evidence to support their inferences.

Ask: Would you describe Modi as proud or humble? Shy or outgoing? Stoic or emotional? Explain.

Discussion Questions
Why is Modi in the news? What steps has he taken to improve India's relations with other countries? Why did some people worry that Modi's election might not be good for minorities in India? Based on what you read, do you have confidence in Modi's ability to help India succeed?

Essential Question
What are the traits of a great leader?

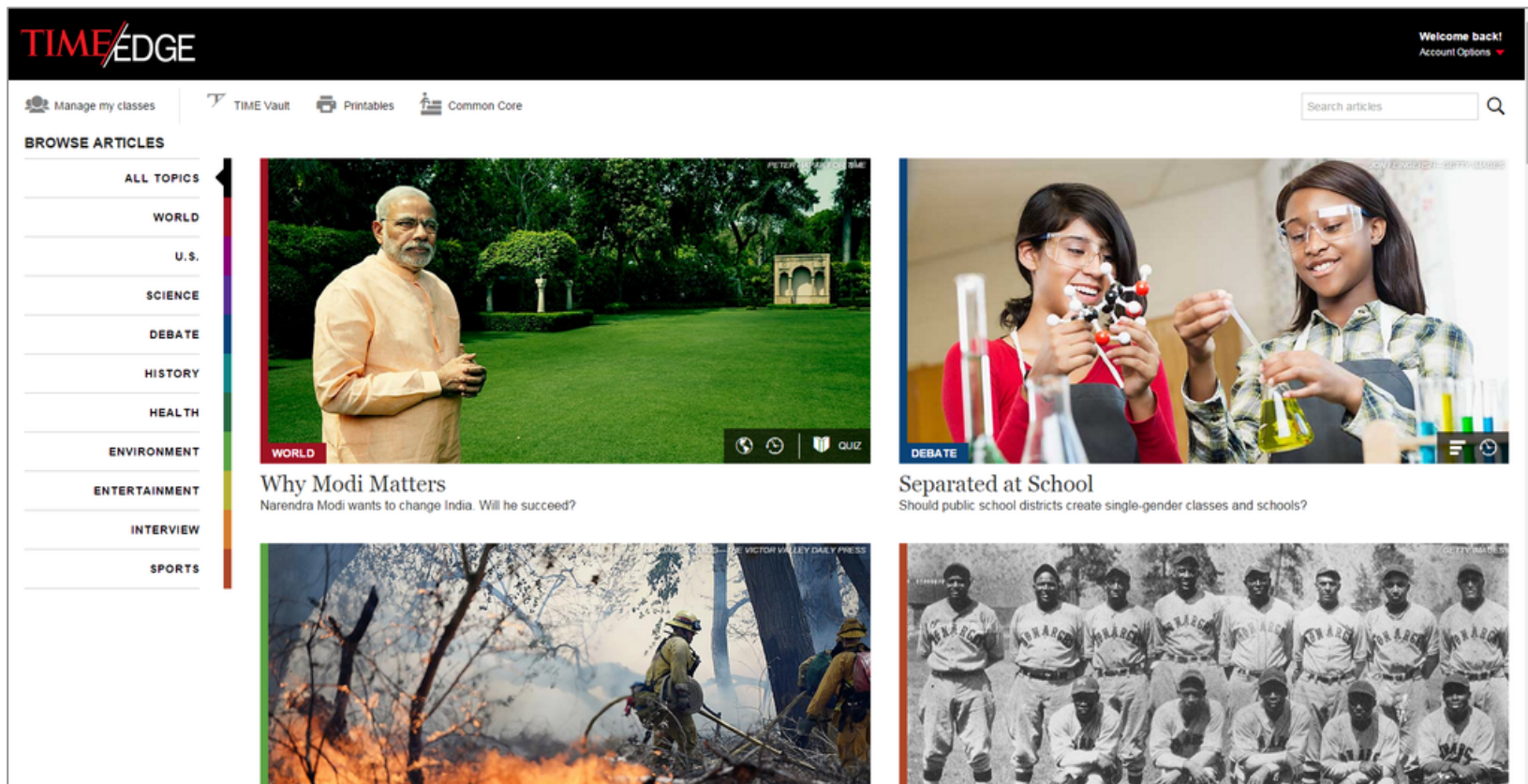

Finding Friends

Among the visitors passing through José Martí International Airport the day I arrived was a group from the U.S. State Department. It was the most senior delegation to visit Cuba in 35 years. They were there to discuss the opening of an American embassy in Havana and a Cuban embassy in Washington, D.C. In 1961, after relations between the two countries fell apart, the U.S. closed its embassy in Cuba's capital. The talks went well, riding the wave of giddy good feeling that greeted the joint statements by Obama and Castro.

"I believe in humanity. We think everything can be better to benefit both countries," says Caridad Alfonso. She is relaxing after work on the Malecón, the seawall that protects downtown Havana from winds that gain force across 90 miles of the Florida Strait. A doctor, Alfonso has met Americans at conventions in the Bahamas. She would like to know more of them.

"I don't have any American friends," says her companion, Leonel Díaz.

"Not yet," says Alfonso with a smile. "He will find them."

Point out that the writer visited Cuba to report on this article. Ask: How might this have impacted the writing?

Have students focus on the writer's description of Caridad Alfonso and Leonel Díaz and their quotes. Ask: What do you think the writer is suggesting about Cubans' attitudes toward their country's changing relations with the U.S.?

Multimedia features, including audio and Spanish translations, make the content accessible for every learner. Teachers also get access to close-reading tips within articles.

When Independence Was Declared

In 1976, in honor of America's bicentennial, TIME produced a special issue imagining what the magazine might have reported on if it had been around back in July of 1776. One particular bit of that week's news stood above the rest: "Although independence had been months, even years, in coming, the week's events seemed startling in their sudden finality," the imaginary correspondent reported. "July 2 declared the fact of separation. In another two days, on July 4, the Congress endorsed an extraordinary document, a Declaration that stated the Colonies' numerous reasons for leaving the imperial embrace. That date and that document may eventually loom larger in the American mind than what happened on July 2, for the Declaration, written by Jefferson, endows the revolt with a philosophical foundation and justification."

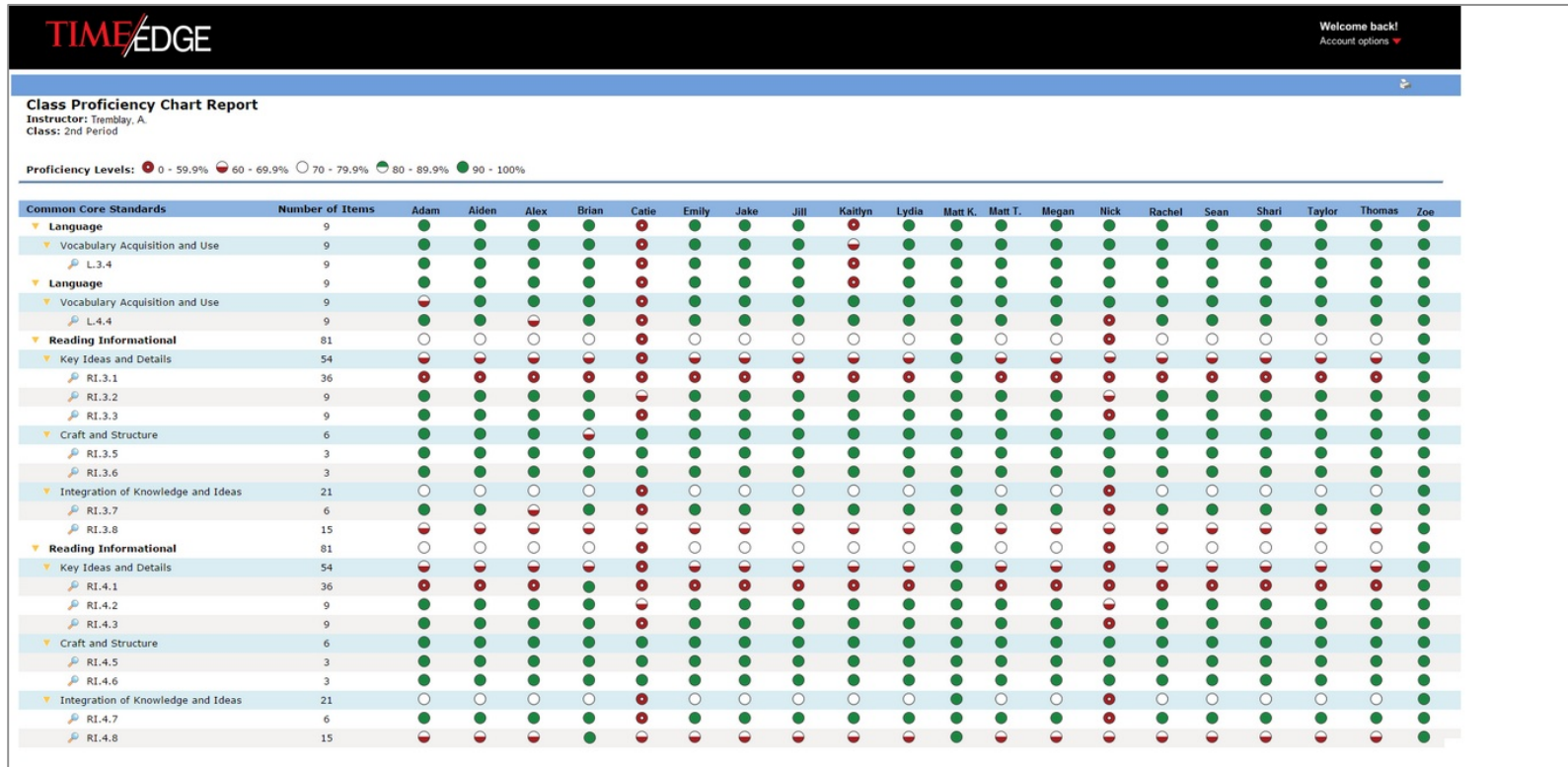
